## ELIGIBILITY FOR A FAMILY ALLOWANCE DURING THE COURSE OF STUDY OF "HUMAN MEDICINE" AND "PSYCHOLOGY"

In view of a recent decision of the Federal Tax Court, the Rectorate of Karl Landsteiner University of Health Sciences (KL) would like to inform students regarding the period of entitlement to a family allowance during the completion of the *Human Medicine MA* or *Psychology MA* degree programmes at KL.

- 1. The lowering of the age limit for receipt of the family allowance to **24 years of age** under the Budget Accompanying Act 2011, Federal Law Gazette I 111/2010 (BBG 2011) also applies to the study of human medicine or psychology as the study framework is divided into a bachelor's and a master's degree program;
- 2. There is **no** entitlement to an extension of eligibility for the family allowance to the age of 25 due to a lengthened duration of studies according to section 2((1)(j) FLAG, as would be possible, for example, for a master's degree course of study in human medicine;
- 3. The Federal Tax Court has justified this by saying that completion of the bachelor's degree at KL already constitutes a completed vocational training, which is why both courses of study (bachelor's and master's degree) <u>cannot</u> be combined to justify entitlement to family allowance until the age of 25 (due to the longer duration of the study program);
- 4. In view of the fact that the Federal Tax Court bases its understanding of the law on rulings of Austrian high courts that justify such a differentiation between the study of human medicine for a master's degree and the cycles of higher education qualifications under the Bologna Framework applied at the KL (at least as seen by the Federal Tax Court), it was decided not to file a complaint against the ruling with the Austrian Supreme Court.
